ANIMAL SERVICES MONTHLY REPORT FOR <u>APRIL 2015</u>

Program Highlights

- Volunteers donated approximately 1698.25 hours in April in the areas of animal care (including puppies, cats, general kennels and horses), administration needs, grooming, cleaning, dishes and linens, and several special events. There were 81 active volunteers in April. Of the 1698.25 original hours, 874 hours were completed by regular KCAS volunteers, 31 hours were completed by one-day volunteers, 120 hours were completed by employment preparation volunteers, 151.25 hours were completed by regional occupational center volunteers (ROC students from the Kern High School District), and 522 hours were completed by work release volunteers. Total volunteer time equates to 9.8 staff members and the value given back to KCAS by current and new volunteers in all areas is \$41,734.69.
- April was a busy month once again for media contact, inquiries and interviews for the Department. The Marketing & Promotions Associate responded to 20 media inquiries and requests providing information to the media on various topics such as field services including wildlife calls; vaccination clinics; spay/neuter resources, Wings of Rescue flights; collaboration with community agencies and, the Department's low-income voucher program. Of those 20 contacts, 17 resulted in interviews or postings for newspaper, television and radio media outlets via video, newsprint on the news agency websites and papers and, on Facebook pages.
- The Rescue Team focused on coordinating the transport of animals for two flights during the month of April, as the Department's Rescue Transport Vehicle was at the garage for maintenance. Together, working with the medical team, the rescue team sent a total of 52 animals on two flights to five different rescues in Washington. Rescue partners saved an additional 200 animals, for a grand total of 252 animals saved in April.
- Our Foster Program continues to grow and save more lives. 76 new animals entered the foster care program during the month of April.
- The Department began featuring adoptable pets on the KBAK29 Health Alert program which airs every Sunday evening. In addition to a featured pet on KBAK29, the Department is showcasing adoptable pets on KNZR Radio with the Jaz McKay show every Monday; 23ABC on Wednesdays and Saturdays and Sundays and, on KIX Country Radio's Facebook and Website page every 2 weeks. The goal is to reach more potential adopters through these media outreach efforts with the Marketing & Promotions Associate.
- Grimmway Farms invited the Department to participate once again in their annual company picnic and health benefits fair in April. The Outreach Programs Manager and the Rescue Coordinator attended the event with an information booth. Staff provided educational materials about responsible pet ownership; spay/neuter resources in the community and general services provided by the Department to approximately 563 attendees.

- Starting July 1, 2013, the Department implemented its first ever Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program for feral and free-roaming cats, joining thousands of other agencies across the country embracing TNR as the humane method to control the feral and freeroaming cat populations. The program has been extremely successful with 107 cats being spayed or neutered and returned to the areas where they were trapped in April. The total number of cats that have been altered since the beginning of the program is 3,043.
- Staff and volunteers once again participated in the Scottish Games & Gathering event. The mobile adoption unit provided the perfect backdrop for the Department's information/adoptable pet area. Due to the hard work of staff and volunteers, 2 dogs were able to find their home at the event. Staff and volunteers interacted with nearly 100 people at the event and helped provide them with information to assist in being a responsible pet owner.
- In April, the Department partnered with 4th District Supervisor David Couch, Valley Vet Non-Profit and the Kern County Parks Recreation District to provide spay/neuter services to residents in the Frazier Park area. 28 animals were spayed or neutered at this clinic. The Department will continue partnering with additional agencies and the Kern County Board of Supervisors to bring spay/neuter services to as many unincorporated residents as possible.
- KCAS hosted two successful, low-cost vaccination, licensing and microchip clinics in Lake Isabella (Lake Isabella Park) and Rosamond (Rosamond Park). 141 licenses, 157 Rabies vaccinations, 107 DHPP vaccinations, 11 FVRCP vaccinations, and 86 free microchips were implanted during these vaccination clinics.
- The Department's new Wednesday evening vaccination, licensing and microchipping clinics at the Fruitvale Shelter location in Bakersfield continued in April with 221 DHPP vaccinations, 11 FVRCP vaccinations, 201 Rabies vaccinations, 187 licenses and 117 microchips issued during the five Wednesday evening clinics.
- We continue to provide free microchips for all pet owners both onsite at all three shelters and at our low-cost clinic locations. We have implanted a total of 8,788 microchips for Kern County residents since the program began on October 23, 2012.
- The Department's medical team was extremely busy this month performing 46 spays and 43 neuters on site for a total of 89 surgeries performed.

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


