March is Adopt a rescued Guinea Pig Month

Did you know that every year, hundreds of guinea pigs find themselves in shelters when their owners decide they no longer can or want to care for them? To combat this abandonment, the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) and Petfinder.com sponsor "Adopt a Rescued Guinea Pig" every March.

Domesticated guinea pigs, also known as cavies, are generally gentle animals that make good family pets, especially for children over six years of age. Small children should always be supervised by an adult when interacting with a guinea pig or any other pet.



Guinea pigs may live to be 10 (human) years old, so the decision to adopt one must be made carefully. Guinea pigs require daily care, including feeding, watering, cage cleaning, exercise, and companionship. They are social animals and definitely want to be a part of your family.

There are 13 breeds of guinea pigs, differing in hair types, colors, and markings. Their variety certainly is remarkable.

In most cases, the process of adopting a guinea pig, or any animal, involves an application process and an application fee. Shelters and rescue organizations want to be sure you understand the commitment you are making to the cavy and to giving the appropriate care that your guinea pig requires:

Housing: Guinea pigs enjoy play and can jump up to 12 inches high. Therefore, the ideal habitat should provide a minimum of 7.5 square feet (30 inches by 36 inches) for one guinea pig and soft roofing. **Toys:** Guinea pigs love to hide, so include cardboard or PVC tubes or other types of hiding places in the cage. **Grooming and general care:** Guinea pigs' teeth grow continuously, and they need to chew to keep their teeth the proper length. Provide your pig(s) with a piece of wood to gnaw on.

ZAP: Yeah....I know.....but it was still good.....until I started to......eh.....never mind.



Coordinator's Corner

Another wonderful month has passed us by, but that's ok. Another month of many dogs and cats going home to forever families!

I sent out a couple of major emails this past month regarding some serious issues.

Confidentiality Agreement

We all have signed a confidentiality agreement which means that if you see or learn of any Personal Identifiable Information (PII) and use it in <u>any</u> way outside of the shelter environment and you're found to be misusing this information, you could be charged with a misdemeanor that potentially can be elevated to a felony charge against you. For those of you who are looking at college or job applications, even misdemeanors can negatively affect your prospects.

I urge and warn you to be very careful about sharing what you see and hear and take pictures of.

Scheduling & no-shows

A schedule is built weekly for you to see and make changes as needed. The first draft is usually sent out on Friday afternoon and the final draft on Saturday afternoon.

What has been bothering me so much for these last 30 days is the number of unexplained volunteer no-shows. Not only are there too many no shows, but often, no reason is provided for not coming in.

One reason that has been suggested is that volunteers don't see their names on the schedule. Now, the schedule can change a lot between first and final drafts, so this can be more of a challenge to new volunteers than it is to you veterans, but it only takes a few minutes to review the schedule and to let me know if it presents a problem for you.
