## Polar Bear Day February 27<sup>th</sup>, 2016

Polar Bear Day is observed on February 27, 2016. It celebrates the world's largest bear and land carnivore. The polar bear is a bear native largely within the Arctic Circle encompassing the Arctic Ocean, its surrounding seas and surrounding land masses.



The polar bear is classified as a vulnerable species, with eight of the nineteen polar bear subpopulations in decline. For decades, large scale hunting raised international concern for the future of the species but populations rebounded after controls and quotas began to take effect.

According to the World Wildlife Fund, the polar bear is important as an indicator of arctic ecosystem health. Polar bears are studied to gain understanding of what is happening throughout the Arctic, because at-risk polar bears are often a sign of something wrong with the arctic marine ecosystem.

In the past, there was a saying about the six degrees of separation. Meaning that within six connections, you could meet up with just about anyone in the world.

There was even a documentary a few years back regarding this, in which a young man was a little more than just a fan of Drew Barrymore. He wasn't a dangerous stalker, but adorned his apartment with pictures of her and had all of her movies, etc etc.

What he did over a couple of months was to make those connections work for him, and eventually he got his meeting with Drew Barrymore. So why do I bring this up? The internet has connected us to a wide variety of topics and created unprecedented openness in communication. It has also opened all of us up to deep scrutiny.

I do not want to lose even one volunteer, because each of you makes such a difference in the lives of our animals. But <u>HEED THIS</u> <u>WARNING:</u> when it comes to the business side of things that occur at the shelter, everything is confidential.

While I do not want to lose you, dismissal will occur immediately if you break this agreement.

Think before you post online. Think before you make a statement that may or may not be correct and make sure you think before you share, forward or link to a site on any social media platform regarding animals and personnel here at the shelter.

I am looking out for the best interest of the shelter, the Volunteer program and the volunteers that make the lives of our animals just a little bit better.
