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National Honey Bee Day, August 20th



National Honey Bee Day is observed on August 20, 2016. National Honey Bee Day (formerly National Honey Bee Awareness Day) for beekeepers in the United States to build community awareness of the bee industry, through education and promotion. According to its organizers, the National Honey Bee Day program started with a simple concept: "Bring together beekeepers,

bee associations, as well as other interested groups to connect with the communities to advance beekeeping. By working together and harnessing the efforts that so many already accomplish, and using a united effort one day a year, the rewards and message is magnified many times over. We encourage bee associations, individuals, and other groups to get involved. The program is free and open to all."

The event was started in 2009 by a small group of beekeepers who petitioned for and obtained a formal proclamation by the USDA honoring honey bees and beekeeping.

The honey bee industry needs your help and support. National Honey Bee Day may be one day per year, but the care of the environment which the bees reside takes a year-long commitment. We encourage all to become good stewards of the environment through practical and commonsense approaches.

Queen – Will live between 1 – 4 years

Workers - Are all females

Drones – Sole responsibility is to fertilize

For the next 16 years, he was my buddy, my friend and my sidekick. Many of you heard in orientation that he would know when I was getting up in the morning and when I was coming home. How I had to see him before I saw my wife.

Unfortunately he followed one of my other dogs out of a hole the she had dug and they decided to take a long walk. At some point that early morning, my little boy was hit by a car and we lost him.

For 16 years, he survived parvo, several skin issues, minor sicknesses and coped with a number of strays, potential adoptees and even fosters that we brought home.
