

May is Pet Cancer Awareness Month

Myth 5: There's nothing I can do to prevent cancer in my pet.

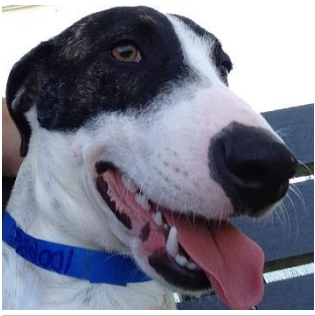

Coordinator's Corner

So I've been asked about the Volunteer Week activities and the lack thereof. Since I was hired, we've had a Volunteer Week and a National Volunteer Day when we would have special tours and activities for the volunteers and members of the public. Due to the very successful creation of MEGA ADOPTION and the need of volunteers at that event, we had to suspend the Volunteer Day events for the foreseeable future. National Volunteer Day was April 21st and Mega Adoption was April 22nd.

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I wanted to take a moment to help you understand the decision by Kern County Counsel regarding minor volunteers and work release. As of April 15<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the decision was that ALL departments cannot allow minor volunteers on County property while work release personnel are present.

The No Saturday plan seemed to work initially, but then there were some other instances throughout the county that made this protocol mandatory on all days; and so KCAS had to follow suit. Now we have been able to work around this a bit, but we still need to be vigilant. As adult volunteers, we will all be responsible to keep our youth safe at times when we have minor volunteers, such as on Wednesday evenings for clinic and any days that work release personnel are not scheduled to be on property. Outside of that, we will be using our current volunteers who are minors for Saturday and Sunday events offsite. We ask all volunteers to be vigilant when it comes to work release personnel or any other adults who we could question at any time and at any event.

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I wanted to take a moment to thank the 21 volunteers who came to Mega Adoption and worked the booth and talked with members of the public on April 22nd. The Fairgrounds building looked really cool with all those green shirts walking in and around it. Next year's event is on May 11th.
